

THE LARGEST LAKES IN THE WORLD BASED ON THEIR AREA:

- 1. Caspian Sea: Although often called the Caspian Sea, it's technically a lake due to being landlocked and surrounded by Russia, Kazakhstan, Azerbaijan, and Turkmenistan. It's the world's largest lake, covering an area of 371,000 square kilometers. It has three regions: Northern, Middle, and Southern Caspian, each with unique characteristics.
- 2. **Lake Superior:** Located in North America, it's the largest freshwater lake globally. It spans parts of Ontario, Canada, and several U.S. states, including Wisconsin, Michigan, and Minnesota, with a surface area of 82,100 square kilometers.
- 3. **Lake Victoria:** The largest of the African Great Lakes, Lake Victoria, is also the world's largest tropical lake, covering 68,870 square kilometers. It's divided between Tanzania, Uganda, and Kenya and is known for its unique wildlife.
- 4. **Lake Huron**: One of the Great Lakes of Canada, Lake Huron stretches across Ontario and the American state of Michigan. It offers numerous tourist destinations along its shoreline, including Manitoulin Island.
- 5. **Lake Michigan:** As the fifth-largest lake globally and the third-largest of the Great Lakes in the USA, Lake Michigan spans nearly 500 kilometers across four states: Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, and Michigan.
- 6. **Lake Tanganyika:** Located in Africa, Lake Tanganyika is the world's second-oldest freshwater lake and the longest. It's known for its unique wildlife, including the endemic storm's water cobra.
- 7. **Lake Baikal**: The deepest lake globally and the oldest freshwater lake, Lake Baikal, is located in Siberia, Russia. It's also a UNESCO World Heritage Site and home to diverse flora and fauna.
